


Being Positive


Being Loyal

You are a trusted and loyal person who is good at keeping confidentiality. The difference you make is to be a trusted confidant and adviser.




Keeping Things Simple




Giving Great Advice

Preparing Students For Jobs That Don't Exist Yet

We want to share with you the current thinking on jobs of the future and skills that will be in demand in the next 20 years. Whilst we can't tell you what these jobs are or which ones will disappear, we can look at the trends and see the direction of employment and career opportunity.

One of the easiest ways to begin thinking about future careers is to focus on what may be a problem in the future and invent a job that will solve it. For example, if cars are to be autonomous (drive themselves) we will need the services of Smart Car Interior Designer who redesign what the inside of a car will look like.

Those educated are more likely to find jobs and secure employment than those that are not. However, education is not a guarantee to a job. Employment and education are linked and having in demand qualifications means secure employment.

New technologies will make some occupations redundant. Automation, robotics and artificial intelligence will impact on existing jobs but many new jobs will be created using these technologies. The rise of new disruptive technologies will occur quickly and there's a shortage of people with the skills to manage and transition to new products and services.

Not all jobs will disappear. Just as not all jobs disappeared when computers were introduced. Today computers help people do a better job; so, automation and robotics will help you do a better job in the future.

Of the non-technology jobs, occupations such as Aged & Child Care, Education, Training, Sales, Construction & Trades, Business and Personal Services will grow. Those studying science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) will find more jobs require this knowledge and expertise. Almost all jobs will require you to be digitally smart and expect you to know more than just the basics.

Not all jobs require a University degree so consider your options in vocational, apprenticeship and skills training. Most countries have a shortage of skilled labour so there is opportunity for employment.

Population is getting older: Biotechnology, genome research and medical science technologies are helping people live better quality lives, curing many diseases.



Ai

Rise of smart machines and systems: Artificial Intelligence (AI) Robots, Autonomous Vehicles and Drones will create new jobs and new materials.

Students GPAs were examined at the end of their first, second, academic years and after graduation. The results showed that good grades are related to having a degree course close to one's personality. In short, you'll earn better grades if you choose a course that matches your personality.

Bachelor of Business in Accounting

Accounting is an integral part of the management process in any business, public enterprise or not for profit entities. It acts as an evaluation and control aid when looking at the effectiveness and efficiency of the operations of an enterprise as well as employee performance. It provides information to assist users in making decisions for a variety of purposes, including the acquisition or sale of shares, lending of money, and provision of goods on credit.

You'll also learn to interpret accounting and auditing standards as you gain new skills in financial statement analysis, forecasting and budgeting, negotiation, ethical decision making and problem solving.

Students can satisfy the entry requirements for admission to membership of the professional accounting bodies when this major is taken in combination with the Professional Accounting Minor. These include Associate membership of CPA Australia, direct entry into the Chartered Accountants of Australia and New Zealand Programme, and Associate membership of the Institute of Public Accountants (IPA).

Bachelor of Business in Banking

Banking is an industry famous for offering a wide range of opportunities, great working conditions and a commitment to ongoing training and learning.

Through this course, students are exposed to the issue of information asymmetry that exists between the borrower and the lender and the need to design contracts that reveal and monitor the quality of the borrower.

The units also consider the nature and legal implications of the banker-customer relationship. The high debt that financial institutions have in their capital structure, the interest sensitivity of their assets and the liquidity that depositors demand result in unique interest, credit and liquidity risk management issues.

Banks and financial institutions work based on having debt built into their structure – and you'll learn to understand the interest, credit and liquidity risk management issues that this can create.

You'll examine how the global banking system works and how it affects the local business environment, as well as international trade.
